- Every year, our NSS unit organizes a socio-economic survey and medical camp in a selected nearby village. Apart from undertaking cleaning operations and educating the village flock about basic amenities of life, students collect information on various aspects relating to the place and teachers help them prepare reports based on this information.
- As a step to make them ecologically aware, our NSS volunteers are involved in planting saplings regularly.
- Various socially relevant services are provided by NSS students like blood donation camp, counter checking of pulse polio drive and health awareness etc.
- To commemorate the World AIDS Day, students and volunteers of both NSS and NCC jointly hold an awareness rally from college where different aspects of health and related matters were represented by posters and banners. Teachers and non-teaching staffs also march with the rally. Our volunteers demonstrate awareness by stitching/wearing red ribbons among Teachers, Non-Teaching Staffs, and Students and also to the commoners passing by.
